CHAIRS REPORT

On behalf of the Brain Injury Nova Scotia Board of Directors, I present this report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 2023.

I enjoyed my past year as Chair, although admittedly I was a bit nervous at the start. I wanted to make sure that I could bring value to the board just as the past two Chair's did, so the challenge was on. One might say that it can be hard to follow in someone's footsteps, while others may say it is time to create your own path. Regardless of one's approach to the role, the strength of the Chair is directly related to the strength of the board, and we have a great board, an active board that brings many levels of experience to the table, a board that has really delivered over the past few years.

But the board is only an extension of the organization, the core team is made up of our great staff, volunteers, and partners. A small but mighty team, the staff each wear many hats in their roles; they work hard and show true dedication to our community. We are very fortunate to have Emily Roeding (Executive Director), Chloe Luckett (Program Coordinator/Podcast Host), Sam Clarke (Director of Marketing and Communications), and Marlee Smith (Navigator).

With this AGM being the end of my role as Chair, I would like to thank all the departing board members: Katie Lister, our past Chair, who brought extensive board experience, provided invaluable support, and was the driving force behind the renewing the Elizabeth Andrews Bursary, and Katie Ellsworth, our Treasurer, who also brought an extensive amount of knowledge and dedication to her role, setting us up nicely for the new fiscal year. A special thanks to Allison Harris for all her work as Secretary and her continued involvement (similar to myself) as a board member at large next year. Paige Black, who served as our survivor rep on the executive last summer, was pivotal in recruiting our new ED. Thank you to past Directors: Boluwatife (Grace) Amore, Jessica Bradstock-Young, Robin Sanford, Dawn Vincent and Zonea Kauffman, who once again devoted her time to supporting the board in between the recruitment of a new Treasurer.



So before I touch on the organization's accomplishments, partnerships, new relationships, and continued support that Brain Injury NS provides to the vast community throughout the province of Nova Scotia, I would like to thank the staff and all the volunteers who put in the hard work to make everything below possible:

- In partnership with March of Dimes Canada, we held the 2nd annual "Pathway to Peers" conference, which exceeded our goal in attendance. And of those that completed the post-event evaluation, 100% recommended the conference, as well as confirming they would attend the next one.
- We continue to successfully bring people together at our Ambiguous Loss workshops. The success of these workshops comes from the excellent support and leadership provided by Marlee Smith and Shelley Pick.
- Our weekly Walk & Talk program success has led to a new relationship next fiscal year with Hike Nova Scotia's "NSWalks", which opens our walking program up across Nova Scotia.
- Through the Department of Communities, Culture, Heritage, and Tourism, we received funding to build and launch an e-learning module. This is in its final edits, and I look forward to announcing its completion.
- The staff were able to identify the need for a parent peer support group. In order to meet this need, the organization will be launching a new virtual program to support the parents of brain injury survivors.
- Through a generous donation from Ultramar Foundation/Parkland, we were able to bring back our "Improv for Anxiety" program.
- In the nick of time, the organization was able to weigh in on a proposed change to provincial auto insurance.
 We were able to express our concerns around the new definition of "minor injury" and a reduced cap on claims.
- The Halifax Stroke Club invited Chloe Luckett to lead a weekly exercise/movement class.
- In partnership with the Valley Community Learning Association (VCLA) in Kentville we have, and will continue to, provide different offerings to the local members.
- Chloe was interviewed live on the 'CTV Atlantic
 Morning' program, with a great reception from both the
 on-air and off-air staff about their own personal
 experiences. We are pleased that we will be returning
 again for further discussions.




- The NS League for Equal Opportunity (NSLEO) received multi-year funding from the province to develop a Quality of Life Index for people living with disabilities in Nova Scotia, and Emily was invited to join the Project Advisory Committee to help guide the work involved in developing the index.
- Staff participated in a stakeholder roundtable, coordinated by the NS Centre on Aging at Mount St. Vincent University, about caregiver education in the province.
- We are in ongoing conversations with the Canadian Royal Purple Society about their potential presence in Eastern Canada and potential fundraising opportunities.
- We also received notice that, as a result of the protracted federal-provincial healthcare negotiations, all organizations (including the Brain Injury Association of NS) will receive bridge funding again in F2023-24.

As we kick off another fiscal year, I know that we will continue on the same successful path we have been carving out for the organization because of our strong, active board and the staff's hard work and experience. In my past four and a half years with the organization, I have seen the strengths of the staff and the board continue to expand.

Lastly, I have the pleasure of passing the gavel to Patrick O'Connell, our past Vice Chair, who will be your Chair for the next two years.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Members are encouraged to read through the year-end financial statements distributed with this package. These statements include important notes that provide additional context.

Fiscal 2022-23 revenue decreased over prior year, because the prior year had \$25,000 more in government grants, as well as a \$20,000 forgivable loan from the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA). In March 2023, we received \$100,000 in cash towards our 2024 government grants, which is why our cash levels look high at March 31, 2023. This is grant income that will be recognized and used in the next fiscal year.

Expenses increased over prior year mainly because we were not fully staffed last year, and we entered into a rental agreement for our Bedford NeuroCommons location mid-year. So in fiscal 2021-22 there was only four months of that rent included. Fiscal 2022-23 expenses show full staff, as well as two rental locations.

BIANS had some carry-forward of grants from the prior year, which balances out our Fiscal 2022-23 deficit, resulting in net assets of \$34,772 at the end of the year.

PROGRAMS & EDUCATION/TRAINING

During this fiscal year, we were thrilled not only to continue offering all of our programs and training sessions from last year but also to continue expanding those offerings by introducing Improv for Anxiety on a regular basis, as well as reintroducing our weekly Walk and Talk program.

In addition to growing our program offerings, we more than doubled the number of community and education events we offered, including the 2nd annual Pathway to Peers, multiple sessions of our popular Ambiguous Loss After Brain Injury workshops, workplace training events for groups such as Mountains and Meadows, ongoing sessions at the Nova Institute for Women, and more.

While we are delighted with the success of this year's programs and community education sessions, we continue working hard to expand our offerings to more communities and offer a more comprehensive selection of sessions to our community. We look forward to furthering this growth and success in 2023/24.

COMMUNITY REACH AND SUPPORTS

In addition to offering our regular support to the community through our Navigator Marlee Smith, we were happy to introduce a new resource for our community this year with our Survivor ID Card program, which provides survivors with a personalized card to be used to their communicate injuries and limitations in social or emergency situations. We were also excited to continue our partnership with the Provincial Government, Sport NS, and Canadian Sport Institute Atlantic to host the second annual NS Concussion Awareness Day at the end of September, which included the release of an awareness video, "The First Few Days After Concussion", Return-to-School and Sport guidelines, as well as a new Concussion webpage on our website to act as a hub for all concussion information and resources in NS.

We continued to ensure our website and our social media pages were updated with the most current information and resources for the provincial ABI community. While the website figures did not show significant increases this fiscal year, this is because we decreased the number of pages on our website by nearly 30% to create a more effortless navigation experience. Consequently, the raw viewership numbers do not correctly represent the success of our website this fiscal year, and the average viewer spent more than 45% longer viewing our website compared to last fiscal year. We also saw decreases in the number of views of our social media posts, primarily due to Meta changing the algorithm used to calculate duplicate views by a user early this fiscal year, which impacted viewership numbers for all organizations. However, this did result in a more accurate representation of our post-engagement rate, which increased 455% this year and is 198% above the industry average.

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INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Directors of Brain Injury Association of Nova Scotia

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Brain Injury Association of Nova Scotia (the organization) that comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO), and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Brain Injury Association of Nova Scotia as at March 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with ASNPO.

Notes to Financial Statements

DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION

The Brain Injury Association of Nova Scotia (the "Association") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated provincially under the Societies Act of Nova Scotia. The Association is a registered charity under the provisions of the Income Tax Act. The vision of the Association is to support Nova Scotians living with acquired brain injuries and their families/caregivers realize their potential through a continuum of programs, services and community supports throughout the province.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organziations (ASNFPO).

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are investments in treasury bills and are valued at cost plus accrued interest. The carrying amounts approximate fair value because they have maturities at the date of purchase of less than ninety days.

Investments

Investments for which there are quoted prices in an active market are carried at fair value. Unrealized gains or losses are reported as part of net income. Investments for which there is not an active market are carried at amortized cost except when it is established that their value is impaired. Impairment losses, or reversal of previously recognized impairment losses, are reported as part of net income.

Revenue recognition

Brain Injury Association of Nova Scotia follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Grant revenue is recorded as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned. Revenue is deferred to match expenses in a subsequent period.

Donation, fundraising and other income is recognized when received.

Government assistance

Government assistance for acquiring fixed assets and related to expenses is recorded as deferred government assistance and is amortized on the same basis and according to the same rates as the related fixed assets or to income as eligible expenditures are incurred. Government assistance for current expenses is recorded as a reduction of the related expenditures. Government assistance for acquiring fixed assets is recorded as a reduction of the cost of related assets.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Contributed services

Volunteers contribute their time to assist the Association in carrying out its activities. Due to the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the statements.

Income taxes

The Association is a charitable organization from which no part of the income is payable or otherwise available for the personal benefit of any director. Therefore, it is exempt from income tax pursuant to Section 149.1 (1) of the Income Tax Act.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Management does not anticipate that actual results will differ materially from those estimates.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization and is amortized over its estimated useful life on a declining balance basis at the following rates and methods:

Equipment

30% declining balance method

The organization regularly reviews its property, plant and equipment to eliminate obsolete items. Government grants are treated as a reduction of property, plant and equipment cost.

Property, plant and equipment acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued. In subsequent periods, financial assets with actively traded markets are reported at fair value, with any unrealized gains and losses reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at amortized cost, and tested for impairment at each reporting date. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

When the organization issues financial instruments that include both a debt and equity component, the entire proceeds are allocated to the debt component, and the equity component is assigned a measurement amount of \$nil.

3. LONG-TERM INVESTMENT

Long-term investment consist of two guaranteed investment certificates bearing interest at 1.45% and 3.25%, maturing October 14, 2026 and November 1, 2023.

The assets held in trust are to be used to be for a bursary program for brain injury survivors entering a post-secondary program. These funds can only be released with board approval. During the year, the board moved to long-term investments.

6. LONG TERM DEBT

Term loan payable to Bank of Nova Scotia under the Canadian Emergency Business Account (CEBA) program. The loan is non-interest bearing up to December 31, 2023. \$20,000 of the loan will be forgiven if fully repaid by December 31, 2023. If not repaid, commencing January 1, 2024, any remaining balance will be converted into a 3-year term loan bearing interest at 5% per annum, and must be repaid in full by December 31, 2026.

7. LEASE COMMITMENTS

The Association leases premises under an operating lease agreement that expires on November 30, 2024. Under the lease, the organization is required to pay \$1,150 per month until November 30, 2024, for a total commitment of \$23,000.

8. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the organization's risk exposure and concentration as of March 31, 2023.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its customers and other related sources, long-term debt, obligations under capital leases, contributions to the pension plan, and accounts payable.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Association is subject to market risk on their investments.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant other price risks arising from these financial instruments.
